## Words our readers used to share their 9/11 memories

Never forget • World Trade Center • something just exploded • a gaping hole in one of the towers • planes hitting buildings • people jumping to escape flames • people leaving, covered with dust • smoke billowing out of the Pentagon • incredible destruction at Ground Zero • the smoke from lower Manhattan • changed the way I view a cloudless sky forever • heroic yet horrible crash of Flight 93 • realized it wasn't a movie • first responders rushing in • crushed by 110 stories • Shanksville, Pa. • the smoke and people running • horrible smell of the black smoke • a third plane hit the Pentagon • huge hole gaped in one tower and a ton of smoke poured out • implosion of both the towers • U.S. fighter jets circling the skies above New York City • unbelievable images • attacked on our own soil • smoke clouds enveloped the whole skyline • Where is it? Where did it go? Where is the building? • color drained from my teacher's face • stunned • incredible devastation • everyone was scared • controlled response • tears ran down my cheeks • nightmares for weeks • shock and horror • filled with trepidation • fear on the faces • tears turned to anger • weight of deep sadness • insecurity • incredible devastation • didn't know what was going to happen next • frantic • sketchy details • confused • lost in maze of unknown • didn't know what to do • magnitude of disaster • unimaginable catastrophe • the end of heaven and hell took over • sense of freedom and safety altered • horrific events • enormity of tragedy • must be at war • how could such a thing happen in America? • this was actually happening • heartbreaking events • nothing would ever be the same • not just a bad dream • don't think anyone believed they could ever fall • disconnected from a new reality • burned into our memories • changed forever • loss of innocence and security • fear of unknown • hard to pull ourselves away • end of our comfortable existence • burning a hole in soul of our country • madness that ensued • what could I do, anyway? • our world's being rearranged • glued to TV • pictures on the screen sent chills down my spine • left for home in fearful tears • hugs and tears fueled by fear • moved around in disbelief • devastation unfolds • gasps of horror • pain and anguish • heavy hearts • a stifled scream • confusion and concern • tried to make sense of the pieces of news • never felt so isolated, vulnerable, scared • helplessness • very frightened • never slept a wink • that's when I lost it • could not sleep that night • why was I spared when others were not • couldn't quite take it in • still cringe when I hear low-flying planes • heart heavy and mind numb • everything seemed different bizarre events we were witnessing • thought of the passengers on the plane • the innocent people working on top floors of that building • tears filled my eyes • sickened to see the towers fall • still haunts me today • never-forgotten day of horror • gut-wrenching feeling • American tragedy • seemed to be a horrible joke • unthinkable happening • modern day of infamy • looked at each other with disbelief • watched with horror • people looking for answers • people needed hope • 9/11 changed our church • watched as tragic day unfolded • no contact home was possible • fielding phone calls from unit members • the order to recall all unit personnel • advised that no calls could go through • phones were jammed • having to go into D.C. to fetch my wife • concerned for my beloved aunt • too hard to find people no idea for two days where her husband was
 finally reached Anne and told her I was OK
 trying to contact family people left to wonder and wait
 making sure we were safe
 did not know where they were
 my son faced hatred and prejudice born of ignorance • worried for my two sons • unbuckling my son so I could hold him in my arms called my husband at work
 thankfully, he was not on duty that day
 often wonder if she made it out of the towers alive • wondering where my son was in New York City • cried with relief • fearing for family and friends in the U.S. trying to get news about my mother-in-law
 thankful that my brother survived
 called home when we could get through • my calls to them wouldn't go through • they were all OK • scrambling to get home • sympathy on four weary travelers • safe in a sister country • welcome to the world, U.S.A. • not allowed to travel freely • kindness and compassion shown by the Irish people • the Swiss people were wonderful to us • extremely sympathetic Icelanders • the flight attendants sobbed • closed all borders • trapped in a "foreign" country • our son had taken an earlier flight and was safe • a sign carried by a Swiss gentleman said, "We are all Americans" • set up cots on the drill floor • guards armed with rifles • fear about flying • Boston airport a ghost town • all U.S. air traffic grounded • never got to the top of the twin towers • flowers and candles in front of American embassies • watched (from 37,000 feet) the tragedy unfold • when we arrived in D.C., everything was chaos • unknown if the bridge was a target • stranded in Atlanta for a week • buses commandeered by the National Guard • cousins had to walk home and it took hours • tourists running for pay phones; others falling to their knees • only hope was to get back to Rochester • walked through the store feeling guilty for being there • flight canceled • Red Cross gave us sandwiches • airline offices crowded and noisy "camped out" overnight at airport
 someone found buses to transport us
 perfect strangers who came together that awful day • hugging one another • how united we all were • disgust that someone could do this to us, our country gathered around TV • a wreck when she finally got home • campus abuzz • looking for semblance of stability • very difficult to comprehend what was happening • but for a twist of fate • donated a couple of dollars • sent everyone home offered prayers for the souls that were lost and for our country
 asked God for his protection for all of us
 beginning of a new world order • if we could only turn back time • asked to go donate blood • all of us must not hate one another work for a better, safer world
 going forward has been the challenge
 find a sane way to deal with this new world order • this great nation • never take it for granted again • my country under attack • cowardly terrorists • most impressive show of patriotism • Pledge of Allegiance took on new meaning • decided to volunteer • many brave and selfless men and women who serve to protect us • our unity solidified • pursuit of freedom for all • country is in danger entire airport sang
 senseless loss of life
 ultimate sacrifice
 so many sons and daughters, gone
 among the missing • would not be coming home • good people lost • lost a college friend • everyone knew someone who knew someone lost • client perished • he had just moved to one of the top floors • those last conversations • last thoughts and words • so many lives lost and broken-hearted families • 346 firefighters died heroes • God Bless America
